

This Snapshot of Achievements highlights key initiatives completed since the Court Safety Framework was released and demonstrates progress towards our vision to deliver inclusive, safe, supportive, and accessible service for people impacted by domestic and family violence (DFV) and sexual violence (SV) in Queensland courts.



Key achievements to improve safety for court users:

- Commenced Sexual Violence Case Management Pilot in Brisbane and Ipswich District Courts which introduced a changed approach to the way sexual violence offence proceedings are managed. It promotes early identification and resolution of pre-trial issues, minimises delays to the court process and provides greater certainty for all court users.
- Commenced Sexual Offence Expert Evidence Panel pilot for sexual violence proceedings in specified courts in Brisbane and Townsville.
- Launched the Language Badge Program to improve frontline services for people who do not speak English as their first language. Staff wear badges identifying the languages they speak (other than English) and offer simple advice such as directions to courtrooms in the court users' native language.
- Implemented specialist DFV court best practice elements at nine Magistrates Court sites to improve the experience and safety for people with DFV matters through coordinated stakeholder engagement and enhanced registry responses.
- Developed a trauma-informed and intersectional strategy for Court Services Queensland and Community Justice Services.
- Developed an introductory DFV training program for court staff to build expertise to support court users who are experiencing DFV.
- Developed a training series for court staff on safety and trauma-informed services including how to apply the new trauma-informed policy.
- Completed a workforce review including staff uplift and new registry structures to ensure courts, and those who work within them, are best placed to improve the safety of women and girls, among other court users navigating the justice system.
- Completed construction of Ipswich and Caboolture courthouse infrastructure upgrades.
- Implemented the **Domestic and Family Violence Live List application** which is now available in 14 locations, giving Magistrates, court staff, duty lawyers and support services real-time access to DFV court listing information to improve coordination, safety and timely support for victims.
- Upgraded videoconferencing capability in 20 courts and 19 remote witness rooms to support vulnerable witnesses to safely give evidence.
